Objectives

This course will cover the ways that screenwriters can implement various psychological themes, issues and topics in their screenplays. Topics that will be covered include: Freudian themes such as the oedipal complex and ego defense mechanisms, Jungian themes such as the collective unconscious and archetypes, Adlerian themes such as sibling rivalry and the inferiority complex, Eriksonian themes of identity crisis and character development, and an in depth study of the hero archetype based on the classic theories of Otto Rank, Joseph Campbell, and others. This course will impart a deeper understanding of how screenwriters can create lasting and meaningful impressions on film viewers through a deeper understanding of the psychological elements of character development, storytelling, and dramatic conflict, and through their portrayals of psychological issues in film.

Assignments

Every student is required to write a short subject screenplay of approximately 20-45 pages, incorporating some of the material covered in class. Every screenplay will be read by the class and discussed thoroughly. Each student is required to submit detailed constructive criticism and feedback, in writing, for every screenplay written for this course.
